Introducing the Cuban Dixie Chicks

November 6 - 16, 2015 the IWFFA went to Havana, Cuba and started the very first women's flag football team.

To a tourist, the city of Havana might seem poor and desperately needing repair as the walls of buildings and streets display cracked concrete. Clothes are hung to dry outside apartment windows, dogs run loose, goods like clothing, shoes, and other basic necessities are difficult to afford. You can buy a delicious meal at a local restaurant for \$5. You can rent an apartment for two person at \$35 a night.

Wi-Fi is not as common to find in people's homes. To get internet connection, it can possibly be found on the street corner where a rich hotel stands that has access to a tower and thus offers a crowd of people sitting and gathered nearby for use of this reception to utilize social media. You go back in time, into the 50's as you see a '57 Chevy Belair, a '55 mercury, or a '55 Buick Riviera driving through the streets. These cars are still running after 65 years!

Not everyone has a phone, let alone an I Phone, or an I Pad, or a computer and a printer. The Cubans certainly live a different life style than what we are use to because of the political suppression over the past 51 years. One might think that life for the Cuban is dire. And it might be for some, but what I witnessed was the opposite. There was a strength in these people and I thought to myself maybe the Cubans understand something the rest of us don't know.





As I walked through the streets with my football, I talked to everyone. There was life! energy! these people were robust and happy. They loved talking to this American and catching my football. One guy pulled out his wallet, after catching my football to show me his drivers license name which read: Jose Wilson. His last name was the same as my football.

For the next few days, I had rounded up women who never saw the sport, who were willing to give it a try. At the trainings, these women were smart, attentive and played as if they had "fire in their bellies". They are strong women, leaders for sure who now call themselves: The Cuban Dixie Chicks - Cuba's very first women's flag football team. Carla, Milerni, Gaysi, Liudmila, Juanita, Melissa, Massiel and Marlen. Their ages range from 17 to 54 yrs. old.

We trained as much as we could, and when the evening training became very dark, we practiced hand offs and running with the ball until it was 7.30 PM when the training was over. These women would have played till midnight if I let them. And this is just the beginning.



Flag Football Magic in Cuba

The small charter plane is taking off and Diane is almost as excited about the flight as she is about Flag Football. Notice I said almost as excited. Nothing consumes her like Women's Flag Football does. We are on our way to Cuba so that she may attempt to bring the sport there. Diane Beruldsen, is president and founder of the International Women's Flag Football Association and is also the international trainer for the sport, which has already introduced Women's Flag football to half a dozen countries not to mention countless cities across the U.S. Diane never tires of teaching the sport to women who are both old and young. She has taught too many groups and individuals to keep track of.

The plane touches down and she starts recruiting in the airport. She never stops. She tells the taxi driver what she is here for and asks if he knows any women who might play. We try to connect with the people we are staying with and she is much more concerned about making the necessary contacts to start a women's and girls flag football team in Cuba than she is about whether we have a place to stay for the night. Luckily, we do have a room. She immediately starts making calls to contacts. This is Friday afternoon. By Tuesday she has already had a practice, developed a team, met with the government officials to establish the sport, met with an editor and journalist of an international magazine for media coverage, and continues to recruit women for the first women's flag-football team in Cuba.



During the little tourist time we have in Cuba, she walks through neighborhoods with her football, drawing attention to herself and making contacts with locals. She talks to everyone: All the men want to play and the women want their sons to play, but, Diane explains her mission- which is to expose the sport to women and girls so they can build new skills, become independent and able to lead. She explains to everyone that she hopes to train the women and then have the women train more women and girls, helping them develop leadership skills while helping the sport grow. Her enthusiasm is contagious as everyone listens. I have never met a person so dedicated, confident and tirelessly obsessed.

Cuba Women's first flag-football practice

At their first practice on Sunday, just two days following our arrival on Friday, the women whom Diane met just a day or two earlier seem thrilled. Just as Diane begins to explain the game, two women are walking nearby and she races to talk to them. Whatever she has said brings them over to the rest of the group and these two women, who are dressed in their Sunday clothes, are now straddling their legs, stretching out, jumping up and down and now are a part of the team.

Luckily there is one woman in the group who is able to translate and with a combination of simple Spanish, simple English and a lot of body language, the two are able to communicate to the rest of the women how to play this new sport which no one has ever seen or heard of before. Some of the women are in sandals and when Diane does the kicking drill, she lends these women one of her shoes. Soon Diane is running up and down the field with one sneaker. They are excited and ready. For almost three hours this group of women, in the hot sun, does everything Diane commands.

At the end, Diane asks if they enjoyed the sport and encourages them to find others to play. They reply they love this new thrill and will bring more players to the next practice.

Hands join in a circle to commemorate this first ever women's flag-football team in Cuba. The women follow Diane's lead for their very first cheer: "All right, all right, all right/ ok, ok, ok/ all right, ok... Cuba flag football!" I call this flag football magic in Cuba and it has been amazing to watch.



PROMOTIONAL TOURS 2015

The IWFFA is a unique sports organization in that we not only support existing team and leagues, but we CREATE new teams and leagues, and, we are willing to travel anywhere in the world.

This year the IWFFA traveled to over half a dozen cities, offering flag football clinics in: Tegucigalpa, Honduras, Grimstad, Norway, Gothenburg, Sweden, Lansing, Michigan, Key West, Florida, Key Largo, Florida, Guatemala City, Guatemala and Havana, Cuba.

Players learned proper techniques for basic flagfootball skills and emphasis was placed on playing the sport with finesse and strategy. All of our clinics were successful, but one would be our last.

40th Michigan Womyn's Music Festival - August 4 - 9, 2015 - By Diane Beruldsen

It was sometime in May when I discovered that this festival would be the last. There was sadness and an urgency to sign up for the fest, one more time to offer our sport to the festy goers and workers.

In the 90's the IWFFA offered its very first flagfootball clinic at this festival. This led to decades of worldwide promotions of the sport for girls and women. So, for sentimental reasons and promotional reasons, I booked my ticket that May day.

I left Stavanger, Norway on August 3rd and landed in Grand Rapids, MI, where I took the festival shuttle bus.

It was a 3 1/2 hour ride to the camp. Getting off the plane, I noticed a group of women gathered at a table. You knew they were festival women. The leader brang all the women at the airport closer, in a circle, and started to give instructions. She asked for volunteers, and I raised my hand to help load the luggage onto the bus. Thus... my journey would truly begin.



The festival is for women and girls only. No men or boys, and it is called: Womyn's land. You can tent or RV, but there are no bungalows, or rooms to rent, you truly live in the woods. Once you walk onto "the land" you live another experience of what could be. Every womyn has to sign up and volunteer for two 4 hour shifts during her stay at the fest, no matter if you paid your full entrance fee, or discounted fee. You walk through tables of sign-up sheets and smiling faces are ready to answer questions about the variety of jobs. There is everything including kitchen work, first-aid tent (at the Womb), security, clean up, child care, you name it. I signed up for shuttle service which meant I would drive a tractor pulling dozens of women up and down the main dirt road (FUN!). The volunteer work ensures that you will socialize and meet women from around the world.

Throughout your stay on "the land", there are support groups for any type of interest or addiction you can think of. There are pages and pages of workshops available in your program magazine for: politics, quilting, LGBT issues, drumming, healing, yoga, swing & country dance, stilt walking, so many to choose from and of course....flag football:)

What was extraordinarily special, is that everyone's energy was positive, fresh and beautiful. You truly felt the magic of the land-which was empowering. The nature was also unique. I enjoyed a walk through the woods, where there were no tents, no human voices, magnificent trees, fresh air, and a beautiful green throughout. It was just me and the universe as I walked through the pristine area and could feel my soul.



Many womyn don't call each other womyn, but rather "sister." As in, "hey Sister"... because we are all one family. I traveled throughout the day with my backpack and football in hand. As I would walk on the land, I would invite girls and women to our flag football workshops. It was hot and I would tire. I eventually would have to lay down my backpack somewhere, unattended for hours or even the whole day, until I was ready to go back to my tent. In my backpack was my: I phone, credit cards, \$300 in cash, and more, which no one touched. It was all there every evening when I returned, everything was safe.

Clothing was optional, and there were some women who only wore smiles. This was wild for me the first time I attended the festival, but by adjusting my prejudices from societal restrictions, I opened a channel in my brain and I felt free. I would put my shirt in my back pocket and keep my hands free to toss the football. When it came time for our flag football scrimmage games, it was "shirts" against the "no shirts" and no one had a problem playing on either team.



In our flag-football workshops, we had a wide variety of players. Women in their 50's, girls in their teens, experienced players, flag football virgins and deaf women who were accompanied by their Signer. The signer was the 9th person in the huddle, and she would interpret the plays for our deaf players.

As a result of this group of players, the IWFFA will offer special clinics just for our deaf players during our three-month promotional tour across the U.S. and Canada next Spring and Summer in 2016. We all had a blast during the flag football clinics, and made new friends; actually... we made "a new family." This year, there were over 6,000 womyn and girls who attended the festival. At the closing ceremony which was held in the evening, it was dark and the sky was filled with stars. Lisa Vogel, the founder of the event, lit a candle. That candle then lit another candle, which lit another and another and another.



As I wrapped the candle, to protect its journey back over the Atlantic, it became clear to me that it is the light which we must focus on. Sisters supporting sisters, passing the light not only from the festival, but for our flag football and all over the world. Womyn supporting one another, the essence of our organization.

To provide an opportunity for all females regardless of race, nationality, age, economic status or sexual orientation to enjoy healthy competition, have fun, develop teamwork skills, learn fair play, good sportship, standardize rules of the game, create new teams and unify exiting teams and leagues to help organize the sport.

And now let me introduce Julie Chovanes.

JULIE CHOVANES INTERVIEW

I decided the best way to write this article was to interview myself. So in what follows, I am both the Q: and the A:

Q: Hi! How are you? You look great by the way!

A: Thank you. So do you!

Q: Thank you!

Q: Now, I'd like to start with you giving us a little background of you.

A: Ok. I am 55, married for 28 years with four kids, a lawyer in Philadelphia.

Q: Anything else?

A: Not that I can think of.

Q: Ha ha ha. You are funny too!

A: Thank you! Well I like to play football. And I am a transsexual.

Q: What's a transsexual?

A: A transsexual is someone who identifies with the opposite gender from their body at birth. I am a female transsexual so I identify with the female gender. I am trans too, which I think of as a broader category of people than transsexual, because it includes gender-queer and other people who don't necessarily think of themselves as either male or female. And I also call myself a trans woman too.

Q: So a transsexual is someone who is legally a woman? Someone who had the "operation"?

A: No, there really aren't any "formal" categories. Someone can call themselves transsexual and have any body they want. Transsexual and trans are about self-identification. So a trans woman who considers herself a transsexual can still have guy parts and be legally a guy because it's hard and expensive to change a body and legal documents. As for me, I am legally a woman: name change, social security, driver's license, passport, insurance, etc. etc.

Q: Why do you call yourself a transsexual? Have you had the operation?

A: Because I want to and none of your business.

Q: Why not?

A: Because a transsexual, trans woman, trans person, shouldn't be defined in terms of their genitals. Do we call men d_ ks or women the c-word? Ok maybe some of them, but not the entire category of men and/or women. And what a person's genitalia are shouldn't be the sum total of how you think about me or any trans person. We are people.

Q: Do you think of yourself as a man or a woman or something else.

A: I think of myself as something else. I see men, women, trans as three categories. I see myself as a trans woman, having the brain of a woman but I started with the body of a guy.

Q: What do you mean having the brain of a woman?

A: There have been over 300 studies of transsexuals' brains, almost all of female transsexuals, and science has consistently found our brains have certain female areas – brain areas that are more like a woman's brain than a man's.

Q: How'd that happen?

A: Trans brains are formed a little differently in their mother's womb. Usually a hormonal trigger is sent out to have the fetal brain start forming gender identity early on. And that trigger is different than the one that tells the fetal body to start forming a gender identity. So in trans people, the brain trigger fires to give the trans person a different gender identity in our brain than the one that fires for our body structure.

Q: Wow that's kind of deep. How do you deal with it?

A: Well I had a hard time with it. Growing up it wasn't easy — we were really conservative Catholics living in a conservative place at a conservative time — the world didn't really know or recognize trans people. And since it didn't, I thought I was crazy or it was Satan or both and I tried to bury it. In the meantime, life happened. And instead of retelling that part here, people can just Google me "Julie Chovanes" if they want to read about it — my life, at least the clean part of it, is pretty much out there on the Internet.



Q: Ok good. Talk about your football and athletic background.

A; So when I was young I played youth tackle football- when I was like 9 or 10, and I wasn't very good but I was big. But I was sort of spacey and slow too. I kept playing anyway and did okay but not great, and I even briefly went out for the team in college at Villanova but by then I was just small and slow. But I really love the game.

Later in life I helped start a kids' flag and tackle township team, and then a high-school team, and I coached both teams too, for about a total of ten years.

I was always an athlete to some extent, but not the best, because my mechanics were bad and no one knew all that much about mechanics really back then. I learned about mechanics through working out and then too when I started coaching, because it is always good if your players can get a little bit of an edge by fine tuning how they move.





Q: Tell us more about your workout. I find this part fascinating.

A: Why thank you! I've done different workouts through the years. I started making them up after a while, because I got bored from just doing the same stuff for years and years. I've been going since I was about 15 and I'm 55 now and you have to do new stuff to keep it moving.

Though the years, I've been through running, trail running, biking (road and mountain,) swimming, powerlifting, skiing, yoga, and now have a mixed workout that I designed for balance, body control and core and body strength. It involves everything from jumping to balance pushups, to flipping tires to kettle bells, as well as a few other things.

Q: Why?

A: Because the body is one of God's gifts, and even if you don't believe in God it is fun to move. And I think I move, in some ways, as well as I did way back then.



Q: Do you ball now?

A: What? Oh you kids today with your expressions! Yea, well I stopped playing for a while and then about five or six years ago I started transitioning and then about three years ago I started playing with the GPFFL in Philadelphia, 7 on 7- a mostly guys, LGBT and ally league in Philadelphia. I was playing as a chick by then. Last year the league asked me to found and coach the Philadelphia Lightning-a woman's travel team. This year I played with the New Jersey Fire at a couple of tournaments as well as with the Tristate Renegades, a spin-off travel team, guys and me, from the GPFFL.

Q: Who is tougher to play against, guys or girls or gays?

A: Haha. You are so funny too!

Q: Thank you!

A; I think all three have their challenges. I usually play O and D line, and the girls are more fun to play with. I yap away out there, and the girls on the both sides of the ball are usually good with it. Guys just mostly grunt. And complain more than girls. And I come out of a woman's game hit in more places than a guy's and usually with more bruises.



And with the gays you just have to tolerate more tantrums. (ha-ha kidding to all my gay friends.)

Q: Are you gay?

A: No I don't think so. I like women, so I see myself as a lesbian, but also as an aging blonde. Sigh.

Q: Is it fair if you play on women's teams?

A: Dude really? I mean I'm 55, so either way most players are half my age. And I know there aren't a lot of 55-year old women, trans, "normal" whatever playing.

Q: Ok, calm down.

A: I know but it's just that part of being trans is people questioning your legitimacy. Which sucks.

Q: Tell me why it is fair for you to play.

A: Well that is an interesting question I guess. At my peak weight I was 270lbs, at my peak ability to move weight (when I was into powerlifting) I could deadlift 505lbs, bench 385lbs and squat 385lbs. But to get to those points I had to work out. Consistently. And then I had to change my workout 'cause I wanted a more flexible body. So now after 40 years of going to a gym, I still go to a gym and have a pretty intense workout. In other words I put in the time to be out there.

And as far as the leftover-guy-muscle-from-testosterone thing, I once got in touch with the guy who co-chaired the Olympic guidelines (he's at Yale) for accepting trans athletes. I was thinking of Women's Olympic lifting. I met all the requirements for trans-ness (hormone numbers, body parts, etc.) and he told me it would be his recommendation that I could and should be able to compete as a woman. Now, I could even compete as a power lifter as a guy, that is partly 'cause I developed muscle as a guy, BUT this is important —even if I did compete the Russian and Chinese chicks would have kicked my ass. They have lifts that are about a hundred pounds more than my best, that weigh about fifty pounds more than me, and I still workout and have for many years.

And finally just to throw this in too, I had two heart attacks about six years ago (when I was struggling with the decision to transition or not) and have six stents in my heart. Yet I still play!!! Yay!

Q: You are pretty egotistical.

A: Well you are the one asking the questions.

(She smiles at me. I smile back at her.)

A: In every single way, and in the best way. Being trans means either hiding it or changing. And neither one is easy. Changing is tough, because changes happen in so many ways, and so many of us lose everything. Family, friends, support structures, etc. I changed but I didn't lose those things. I am privileged beyond belief. So I now focus my life on helping others- other trans people less fortunate than me. I founded a trans clinic in Philadelphia, with three other trans woman, and we are just starting to provide legal, social and medical services to trans people, which so many need. Most of us have issues, not from being trans but from how others see us, and so a lot of people in my community need help. I am privileged and fortunate enough now to be living a life where I can help those less fortunate than me. Which, for me, is really what I think I need to do; and what God has made me to do. So not to sound hokey but I found me and the best way to my life I can imagine.

Q: Thank you! You are a lovely interview.

A: Well thank you! And you are a lovely interviewer!

Meet the Lauria Brothers
Top Officials of the IWFFA "We only take
the field for the love of the game"

Having been raised on "Condeluci Hill" in Pittsburgh, with 200 relatives, the Lauria Brothers have a strong sense of Family. Their commitment is extended to their family avocation, football officiating. Eldest brother Jim is the side Judge, youngest brother Dean is the Side Judge and Denny the middle brother is the Referee. Jim says; "We're brothers, we're blood and we know exactly what one another will do in any given situation- a great benefit in high school football games that sometimes go from the sublime to the ridiculous as they ebb and flow.

All three brothers played football at Sto-Rox High School, wore the same number (61) and played the same position. Denny also played 15 years in the NFL minor Leagues for the Sto-Rox Rangers. His 1966 Sto-Rox team won the prestigious WPIAL Class A Championship. He has since been brought in to the Sto-Rox Sports Hall of Fame as a player on that team and the NFL Minor Hall of Fame as a player and an official. Jim was the first MVP in the Family and the Captain of the Stowe High 1964. Dean was the second MVP on his 1980 Sto-Rox team. Dean began his officiating career in 1994. With his brothers mentoring him, Dean has risen to a Division I status working in the Northeast Conference.

Denny's flag-football roots go back to his beginnings in officiating, 1984, working in the PFFL (Pittsburgh Flag Football League) and the MFFL (Municipal Flag Football League) both sanctioned leagues within the USFTL, (United States Flag and Tag League). He has also officiated the National Championships in Florida for the past 20 years, refereeing the A, B, and C championships annually. This association led Denny to the IWFFA (International Women's Flag Football Association) and their administrator, Diane. She has utilized Denny and his brother Dean- having them share the duties of officiating the International Tournament in Key West for the past three years.

The brothers' love of football and officiating has extended to the next generation- with son Salvatore competing on the Sto-Rox Football team and also officiating at the midget level. Daughter Lucia was a three letter sportswoman earning letters in swimming, lacrosse and volleyball. Mama Lauria, 92 years young, also gets in on the act-providing sumptuous meals (sometimes too sumptuous bowls of "Pasta Fagioli" and good garlic bread) prior to the guys leaving for a game. Brother Jimmy always says it's the garlic that keeps everyone in line and not Brother Denny's judgment or our officiating.

Why We Donate By ·NJWFF - FIRE

A while back NJWFF (New Jersey Women's Flag Football) donated money so that women in Honduras could afford to go to a flag football tournament. We were only a small part of sponsoring them. The question of why we should support them came up at board meetings (we are a non-profit). The IWFFA asked that I write about it. Why women should support women seemed a rhetorical question to me but since it has been asked a number of times I thought I could express our thoughts. It is part of our charter to grow women's flag football. In our charter we go on to explain that by growing a sport dominated by men we can gain understanding, respect, and acceptance. But why make a donation so far from home? Well, simply put, all women should play. They don't have to play football but they should play.

Women learn so much from playing. The Billy Jean King Foundation (check out their website) has done extensive research into what playing a sport does for women. I know I'm preaching to the choir but women who play sports do better in their careers. It levels the playing field. Women who play organized sports understand the unwritten rules in the work place, according the Billy Jean King Foundations research, and it makes sense to me. Men have had this advantage for a long time and now since title 9 we are gaining. Women understand not to confront the boss (the coach) in public but to take concerns to them in private. They understand to protect the integrity of the team you don't' gossip about teammates or the coach, you bring concerns to the captains or coaches (supervisors/bosses). understand the hierarchy of the work place. They understand their role and where they fit on the team (project).

I know that people learn life's lessons through a number of ways but I learned everything I ever needed to know on a court or a field. I learned teamwork, leadership, dedication, commitment, time management, goal orientation, respect for authority, how to win and lose gracefully. Every woman should have the opportunity to experience this.




